## MUNDINGSHYTTEN, Besselfjordhytten

- Danish trappers' hut built in September 1932 for Nanok by Evald Rasmussen and Arne Philbert, Bessel Fjord.
- About 1 km south-east of Kap Møbius and Kaphytten [537-2], on the south side of the entrance to Bessel Fjord.
- $\underline{B}$  (IIA). 250 x 205 cm including porch. Coal stove: L. Lange & Co.. Floor: Earth.
- In 1992 Arne Philbert said that the hut was built of surplus materials from the Bessel Fjord station. 1603 On 11th March 1937 Hans Ludvig Jensen wrote that the hut: "is similar to "Hundehuset" [535-3], but more cosy as it is tight; but these huts are much too small,

even for one man". <sup>1604</sup> The hut has from time to time been confused with Hundehuset / Terrasso-hytten [535-3], which is located about 13 km to the south. <sup>1605</sup>

## **KAPHYTTEN**

- Norwegian trappers' hut built in November 1932 for the John Giæver Expedition by Otto Johnsen and Ove Høeg, Ottostrand.
- At Kap Møbius, about 1 km north-west of Mundingshytten [537-1] on the south side of the entrance to Bessel Fjord.
- <u>C</u> (IIA). 300 x 200 cm including porch. Coal stove: OM&S. Floor: Wood/Earth.
- On 10th November 1932 Ole Sivertsen wrote: "Arrived at the main station today after having said hello to Otto Johnsen and Ove Høeg. They were going to build two trappers' huts". 1607 The eastern wall in the hut bears the following inscription: "Denne hytte med omkringliggende terreng eies af John Giævers Grønlandsekspedisjon. Ilandført 12/8-1932". (This hut with surrounding territory is owned by the John Giæver Greenland Expedition. Taken ashore 12th August 1932).

**538** / 75°57.91′N – 20°48.23′W / Hochstetter Forland <sup>1608</sup> **FREDHAUG**, Svarthammerhytten

- Norwegian trappers' hut built 3rd September 1932 for the John Giæver Expedition by Ole Sivertsen and John Johnsen, Olestua.
- On the west side of the river on the south side of Bessel Fjord, about 12 km west of Trums Ø.
- $\underline{C}$  (IIA). 295 x 195 cm including porch. Coal stove. Floor: Wood.
- On 2nd September 1932 Ole Sivertsen wrote that they started to build the hut: "and finished

the framework and made floor, walls, ceiling and doors". And on 3rd September: "We have put roofing felt on the hut, made furniture and started to put up a wall of turf". 1609

- Danish trappers' hut built 15th August 1938 for Nanok by Christian Jensen, Franz Dalskov and Christian Petersen, Mønstedhus.
- On a small islet on the north-west side of the cove at the head of Bessel Fjord, about 2 km south of "Botten" [541].
- C (IIA). 200 x 200 cm. Coal stove. Floor: Earth.
- J.G. Jennov wrote that they arrived at: "the head of the fjord, where we started to build a hut on a small islet, which is connected with land by a narrow bank of gravel" ... "At noon the hut was finished".1611

**540** / 75°58.91'N – 21°22.03'W / Ad. S. Jensen Land<sup>1612</sup> **JOHNS HYTTE**, John Johnsens hytte, Jonshytten

■ Norwegian trappers' hut built 1st September 1932

for the John Giæver Expedition by Ole Sivertsen and John Johnsen, Olestua.

- On the west side of a small peninsula on the north side of Bessel Fjord, about 13-14 km east of the head of the fjord.
- <u>C</u> (IIA). 295 x 195 including porch 100 x 195 cm. Coal stove. Floor: Wood.
- Named after the trapper John Johnsen, who wintered at Olestua from 1932-34. <sup>1613</sup>

- Norwegian trappers' hut built 28th August 1932 for the John Giæver Expedition by Ole Sivertsen and John Johnsen, Olestua. 1615
- On the north-east side of the peninsula at the head of Bessel Fjord, about 2 km north of "Gåseholmhytten" [539].
- $\underline{C}$  (IIA). 300 x 200 cm including porch. Coal stove. Floor: Wood.
- On 26th August 1932 Ole Sivertsen wrote that: "we started with the hut and continued working until the evening". And the following day: "Today we finished the hut, and tomorrow we'll start to build a wall of turfs around it". 1616
